WASTEWATER TREATMENT PLANT BREAKS GROUND



June 14, 2024, was an exciting day for the Town of West Yellowstone as the groundbreaking event happened for the new mechanical Aero-mod wastewater treatment facility. The Town of West Yellowstone has been under a moratorium for years now since it has outgrown it's current lagoon system. The new wastewater treatment facility will be in the existing location west of Town.

This project has been an ongoing mission of the Town of West Yellowstone for years. With a project of this magnitude it takes a series of partners to get something like this completed. First off, the partnership with the Montana Department of Transportation of Aeronautics for the use of their land for the wastewater treatment facility and with Forsgren Associates Inc. who is the engineer for this project. In late 2023, the partnership with RSCI was started as they were awarded the construction portion of this project and of course the partnership with Department of Natural Resources & Conservation for grant money along with loans to pay for this project.

The total budgeted amount for this project is \$38,552,244. The contract completion date is November 27, 2025.

The new mechanical wastewater treatment plant will be able to process 1.5 gallons of wastewater in a day. Right now the Town is experiencing a rate of 750,000 gallons on average of wastewater. The difference of this amount will allow for the sewer moratorium to be lifted and for the 80 acre development on the west side of Town.

TEMPORARY TRAFFIC CALMING PROJECT ON FIREHOLE AVENUE WILL BE INSTALLED IN JULY

The <u>Business Improvement Advisory Board</u> (BIAB) is partnering with MSU's <u>Western Transportation</u> <u>Institute</u> (WTI) to slow vehicle speeds and improve safety near four intersections along the Firehole Avenue/ HWY 20 corridor. The four intersections include Dunraven, Firehole, Geyser, and Hayden.

Pop-up style traffic calming will be installed with treatments that include curb extensions or bulb-outs, and improved signage at the Geyser crosswalk. The pilot project will be a temporary, seasonal installation from July-September this year. Data will be collected and if the project proves successful, you can expect to see it year after year.

Chief of Police, Mike Gavagan, advised the planning group that safety along the Firehole Avenue section is of great concern, as they see many drivers exceeding the speed limit especially through that corridor.

WTI, based at MSU, is the country's largest universitybased research center focused on rural transportation issues. This project is funded by WTI, the Town of West Yellowstone and the West Yellowstone Foundation.





TOWN OF WEST YELLOWSTONE'S FIREWORKS REGULATIONS



The discharge of fireworks are allowed in the Town of West Yellowstone between 12pm - 11 pm on July 3 and 12pm - 12am on July 4.

DO NOT discharge fireworks from or into any national forest, national park, state recreation area, or state highway, within one hundred feet of a church or medical clinic or within fifty feet of any business, in the downtown business area, City Park, Historic District, Grizzly Park or the new 80 Acres (aka "Old Airport"), within two hundred feet of any flammable fuel or compressed gas (propane tanks)

DO clean up any debris, garbage or litter that is left behind!

YELLOWSTONE SHORTLINE TRAIL IS IN ITS SECOND BICYCLE SEASON

Nearly 20 years ago the ladies at Freeheel & Wheel dreamt of a destination bike trail starting in West Yellowstone, connecting to trails all the way to Jackson Hole. The West Yellowstone stretch of the trail is now open for non-motorized recreation! This includes a 10-foot-wide paved path with a several bridges covering approximately 9 miles and will eventually include amenities such as benches, and interpretive signage focused on the history of the area. The group plans to host a Grand Opening Celebration in early September 2024.

WEST YELLOWSTONE ANNUAL DRINKING WATER QUALITY REPORT



The Town of West Yellowstone's 2024 Annual Drinking Water Quality Report, covering the period from January 1 to December 31, 2023, details the quality of the town's drinking water and the efforts made to ensure its safety. The report emphasizes the sources of drinking water, including rivers, lakes, and wells, and explains that as water travels, it can pick up various contaminants from natural and human activities. The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) sets regulations to limit these contaminants, and the report encourages vulnerable populations to seek advice on drinking water safety. Public participation in water quality discussions is encouraged through town council meetings.

The report provides a detailed summary of water quality test results, including levels of contaminants like lead, copper, manganese, arsenic, fluoride, nitrate, and uranium. For instance, lead and copper levels were within safe limits, with copper at 0.312 ppm and lead at 1 ppb. Arsenic and fluoride were detected but below the maximum contaminant levels. The report also outlines definitions and measures used in the tests, noting that some people may be more susceptible to contaminants than others. Overall, the town's water sources, including wells and springs, showed compliance with safety standards, ensuring safe drinking water for residents.
